#### **Call Notes**

Happy New Year! On behalf of everyone at Ventura Audubon, we wish you a safe and happy 2024! We had an amazing year in 2023. Our shorebird recovery team recorded a record number of western snowy plover nesting pairs at Ormond Beach this season, for the first time since we've been involved in this effort; in fact, we met the Fish and Wildlife Service goal for the number of pairs. In 2023 we had the most members in our history, thank you! In 2023 we formed and maintained collaborative partnerships with the Cities of Port Hueneme and Oxnard, The Port of Hueneme, The Nature Conservancy, The California Coastal Conservancy, The California Conservation Corps, Coastal Keepers, and CAUSE. We will continue to work with all our partners in 2024 to ensure the success of our mission of protecting birds and their habitat. We'd like to thank our donors and members for an excellent 2023 and look forward to 2024

There's a lot to look forward to: an amazing lineup of guest speakers, nesting season, volunteer opportunities and field trips with our talented field trip leaders. In January we get to look forward to hearing how the Christmas Bird Count went. Last year, our species count was well above the historical average at 188. Hopefully this year we' do even better! The count day is on December 30, and week goes until January 2. Be sure to let Frank DeMartino know at <a href="mailto:venturabirdcount@gmail.com">venturabirdcount@gmail.com</a> if you see a species you think we may not have counted yet.

If you haven't had a chance to head out on any field trips lately, I highly recommend trying to catch one coming up. Last month the group had a windy, but beautiful morning at the settling ponds where they saw 31 species including Redbreasted Mergansers, a Belted Kingfisher, Cinnamon Teal and many more. Keep reading to see when and where to meet.

California Condors in the Los Padres National Forest:

**A Brief History and Current Trends** 

Speaker: Bryant Baker

Director of Conservation and Research at Los Padres Forest Watch

Bryant Baker is the Director of Conservation & Research at Los Padres ForestWatch, a nonprofit organization based in Santa Barbara, California dedicated to protecting the Los Padres National Forest and other public lands in the region. His research focuses on fire ecology and management in shrubland and forest ecosystems in California. Bryant is a GIS analyst and cartographer, and his maps on land use and wildfire have been published by the Los Angeles Times, San Diego Tribune, Oregon Public Broadcasting, Montana Free Press, Mother Jones, and other media outlets. In addition to his conservation work and research, Bryant is a plant and landscape photographer—specializing in post-fire habitats and native plants in California—whose work has appeared in books, magazines, and newspapers across the




region. He also provides educational information about native plants and ecosystems of California on Instagram as @ bryant.the.shrublander

## Ventura Audubon Christmas Bird Count Saturday December 30, 2023

#### Ventura Count Circle

Each winter the Christmas Bird Count (CBC) is a chance to participate in the oldest and longest running community science project. Click <a href="here">here</a> for information from National Audubon on the history of the CBC, and <a href="here">here</a> for reports from 1900-present.

Each Audubon chapter counts a 15-mile diameter "count circle". The same circle is counted each year for consistency. The Ventura Audubon count circle is subdivided into 8 sectors (see map to the right). Each sector has a leader who organizes teams within their sector, and the entire circle is organized by our CBC coordinator and compiler, Frank DeMartino. Frank will report the data



after the count is completed to the National Audubon Society database.

#### What are we learning from the CBC?

Each year CBC data is added to a database and is available to researchers and the public. The Ventura count has been held each year since 1980. Brad Sillasen created

an interactive database that shows trends in bird populations within Ventura Audubon's Count Circle. Below is an overview of the data we have collected. To explore the data, please visit the website link below:

#### Notes from the Field -- September - November 2023 by Dave Pereksta

This period was highlighted by two outstanding birds for Ventura County. A **Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher** was seen briefly at the Ventura Settling Ponds on 21 Sep (SK). This is the second county record and the first for Ventura since 1974 when California's first was found at Sycamore Canyon. A **White-rumped Sandpiper** was on the Oxnard Plain 11-17 Sep (LS & DP). This was also a second county record and the first in the county since 1988.

Wood Ducks included two at Calleguas Creek on 2 Oct (ZA), one at the Saticoy Spreading Ponds 14-25 Oct (RM), and one at the Ventura Settling Ponds 15-21 Oct (KS). A Long-tailed Duck was at Ormond Beach 22-25 Nov (AS). ACommon Gallinule was at Point Mugu on 3-24 Nov (DP) and another was at the Ventura Settling ponds on 16 Nov (MBo). A Mountain Plover was on the sod fields along Arnold Road 29 Oct-2 Nov (JF & RC) with a second bird there on 1 Nov (SC). A Semipalmated Sandpiper was at the Santa Clara River Estuary on 2 Sep (NA), and a late Semipalmated Sandpiper and a Red Knot were on the Oxnard Plain on 24 Sep (LS & DP). As many as five Stilt Sandpipers were on Oxnard Plain 1-20 Sep and 6 were there 24 Sep (LS & DP). A Western Cattle Egret was in Fillmore 10-26 Sep (TT), one was on the Oxnard Plain 15-17 Sep (DP), two were at the Ventura Settling Ponds 13-19 Oct (AF) increasing to eight there on 29 Oct (MB), and one continued at the Saticoy Spreading Ponds through 18 Nov. A Neotropic Cormorant was in the Arroyo Simi 4-10 Sep (PR)

Two **Broad-winged Hawks** were over Camino real Park on 3 Oct (GA). A**Swainson's Hawk** was in Ormond Beach on 31 Oct (AS). There were several **Zone-tailed Hawk** sightings in the Ojai vicinity and it is not clear how many individual birds were involved including north Ojai on 6 Sep (JM), Casitas Springs on 5 Oct (EC), Mira Monte on 18 Oct (JM), Lake Casitas on 14 Nov (SK), and Sisar Canyon on 28 Nov (SK).

White-winged Doves included individuals in midtown Ventura on 16 Sep (SS) and 14 Oct

(MBr), one in east Ventura 9-12 Oct (DP), one at Arroyo Verde Park 13-15 Oct (GP), and one at Point Mugu on 3 Nov (DP). A **Yellow-bellied Sapsucker** was at Canada Larga 24-25 Nov (MB). **Red-naped Sapsuckers** included one at Taft Gardens 8-28 Nov (JM) and likely a returning one at Lake Casitas 12 Oct-30 Nov (LO).

Ventura's fourth **Dusky-capped Flycatcher** was at Camino Real Park on 2 Oct (DP). A **Tropical Kingbird** was at the Ventura Settling Ponds on 19 Sep (GA), one was at Ormond Beach 20 Sep-13 Oct (SK), and another was in Ventura on 10 Oct (ASz). **Eastern Kingbirds** included one at the Saticoy Spreading Ponds on 1 Sep (BM) and another at Point Mugu on 12 Sep (MR). A Returning **Gray Flycatcher** was at Arroyo Verde Park 23-30 Sep (MBr) and an **Eastern Phoebe** was at Canada Larga on 26 Nov (NB).**Plumbeous Vireos** were at Mission Oaks Park 27-29 Oct (RCo & KW), Sheills Park on 1 Nov (SC), and Rancho Simi Park 6-28 Nov (ND). Two **Chestnut-backed Chickadees** continued at Rincon Creek through 16 Nov. A **Sage Thrasher** was at Lake Casitas 14-16 Nov (SK) and a**Pacific Wren** was at the Ventura River Preserve on 14 Oct (CM et al.).

An **Evening Grosbeak** was near the summit of Mount Pinos on 20 Oct (AS) and two were near the Mount Pinos Campground 27 Oct-4 Nov (DP & SP). **Lark Buntings** included individuals at Canada Larga Road on 28 Sep (JB), the Saticoy Spreading Ponds on 30 Oct (RM & JMc), and Emma Wood State Beach 13-16 Nov (SK). As many as two **Bobolinks** were at the Saticoy Spreading Ponds 15-17 Sep (RM & AA). **Orchard Orioles** included individuals at the Camarillo Outlet tipus on 12 Sep (SC), Saticoy Spreading Ponds on 1 Oct (RM), near Brown Barranca on 19 Oct (EC), Ventura on 10 Nov (RM), and at Bubbling Springs Park 29-30 Nov (MB & RCo). A **Baltimore Oriole** was at the Camarillo Outlet tipus 15-18 Sep (KS).**Clay-colored Sparrows** included individuals at Canada Larga on 17 Sep (SS) and 29 Sep (MB), Emma Wood State Beach on 2 Oct (NA), Channel Islands Regional Park on 4 Nov (SK), and Ventura 5-24 Nov (MBr). **Swamp Sparrows** included two at the Saticoy Spreading Ponds 1-25 Nov (GA), one at the Ventura Beach Marriott on 9 Nov (MBi), and Lake Casitas on 16 Nov (MB).

A **Northern Waterthrush** was at the Ventura Settling Ponds 23 Sep-1 Nov (GA) and another was at Sycamore Canyon 28 Sep-4 Oct (GA). **Black-and-white Warblers** included individuals at the Camarillo Outlet tipus 8-10 Sep (DS), the Saticoy Spreading Ponds on 19 Sep (VP), the Ventura Settling Ponds 22 Sep-12 Nov (ASz), Sycamore Canyon 22 Oct-6 Nov (DP), and two at Pitts Ranch Park on 18 Sep (JB).

Tennessee Warblers were at the Camarillo Outlet tipus on 27 Sep (MB), the Lombard tipus on 10 Sep (SS & MB), Anacapa Island on 22 Sep (SK), Sycamore Canyon 29 Sep-2 Oct (SC), and the Ventura Settling Ponds 14-19 Oct (BS). Lucy's Warblers were widely reported with individuals at the Camarillo Outlet tipus 6-16 Sep (JMu) and likely a different individual there on 7-10 Oct (SC), Dunkirk Park on 29 Sep (RM), West Village Park on 29 Sep (RM), the Gonzales tamarisks on 8 Oct (MB), the Ventura River on 12 Oct (DP), and Oxnard College on 14 Sep and 12 Oct (SC). Virginia's Warblers were at Bob Kildee Park on 6 Sep (SC), the Camarillo Outlet tipus 9-10 Sep (MB), and Ventura on 18 Sep (MT). American Redstarts were at Arroyo Verde on 10 Sep (MBr), the Lombard tipus on 11 Sep (KK), Oxnard College on 17 Sep (TT), Sycamore Canyon 28 Sep-4 Oct (VB), and the Ventura Settling Ponds 2 Oct-1 Nov (PS). Two were in Ventura on 1 Nov (NA). A Northern Parula was at the Ventura Settling Ponds 6-8 Oct (MB). A Magnolia Warbler was at Wildwood Park 25 Oct-4 Nov (BCB & SB). A Chestnut-sided Warbler was at Sycamore Canyon 29 Sep-1 Oct (TT) and another was at Harmon Park on 10 Nov (RM). A Blackpoll Warbler was at the Lombard tipus 9-11 Sep (MB). Palm Warblers included individuals at Dunkirk Park (RM & MR), Valle Lindo Park 17-19 Oct (DP), Bob Kildee Park on 31 Oct (DP), and the Saticoy Spreading Ponds 12-25 Nov (RM). A Canada Warbler was in Ventura on 10 Sep (SR) and aPainted Redstart was at Kenney Grove Park 27 Oct-1 Nov (TT).

**Summer Tanagers** were at Rincon Creek 8 Oct-18 Nov (OJ) and Sycamore Canyon 3-10 Nov (SS). A **Rose-breasted Grosbeak** was on the Oxnard Plain on 17 Sep (DP). An**Indigo Bunting** was at a feeder in Ventura 7-13 Nov (RM) and a**Painted Bunting** was at a feeder in Faria on 5 Oct (EBC).

There is an optional Bird Walk on Sun Jan 7, 2024 at 8:00 AM (PST) where we will test our waterfowl ID skills!


