Call Notes

Western snowy plover nesting season is here! Today, March 15th, is the official start of nesting season. This week we begin our weekly nest surveys, which will continue for the next 6 months. It's a long season! We'll be presenting to both Oxnard and Port Hueneme City Councils in the next month to spread the word about what we do and how everyone can help protect these birds.

We've been working hard for the past month putting up habitat fences on Ormond Beach. I'd like to extend a huge THANK YOU to Oxnard City Corps and CSUCI volunteers for doing the heavy lifting on this project these past few weeks. We are now working on printing and putting up signs for the fences. Look for more news and updates in upcoming newsletters! Or visit our Shorebird Recovery webpage

Snowy plover nests have already been found at Fort Ord Dunes State Park and at the Coal Oil Point Reserve. We have started to see birds pairing off and scraping (making

nests in the sand) on Ormond Beach, but no eggs yet. We typically see our first nest before the end of March on Ormond, so we are watching carefully. Hollywood Beach typically starts nesting later in the season.

To support the ongoing work of our Shorebird Recovery Program, we will be hosting a fundraiser in early April. From April 2nd to 4th, 2021 we will be holding an online silent auction and speaker event called "Raise the Roost". This work ensures the continued conservation and protection of our locally nesting snowy plover and California least tern populations. As our program continues to expand, our need for funding becomes more important each season

Dr. Amy Denton will present a program and discussion about the causes of climate change and what this means for birds, their migration patterns and their future. This is a special program geared to the interests of our Audubon audience.

Dr. Denton has extensive academic and research experience studying the impacts of climate on worldwide flora and fauna. Drawing on her experience she will explain the causes of climate change and how it is impacting wildlife. Dr. Denton



will also include data from the National Audubon Society, to discuss what these changes mean for birds, their migration patterns and their future. Dr. Denton is looking forward to meeting our audience and answering your questions about birds and climate change.



Speaker Biography

Dr. Amy Denton has been a biology professor at California State University Channel Islands since 2003. Originally from New York, she received her Ph.D. in botany from the University of Washington, was a National Science Foundation/Alfred P. Sloan postdoctoral fellow in molecular evolution at UC Riverside, then faculty in the University of Alaska Fairbanks Department of Biology & Wildlife and herbarium curator at the UAF Museum of the North.
