Call Notes

Ventura County is an amazing place. We have undammed river systems that went very wild during the storms in early January. I spent guite a bit of time photographing both the Ventura and Santa Clara Rivers and some of our coastline during and after the storms. In addition to being a bird enthusiast, I am also a surfer and am active in the Ventura Surfrider Foundation. What struck me most about these storms is how both river systems and parts of our coast changed and are continuing to change. It also increases my concern for coastal bird habitats under threat by sea level rise. While homes and businesses can be moved and rebuilt, the loss of coastal habitat necessary for the survival of many bird species may result in the disappearance of these birds in our county. The Ventura Audubon Society is committed to being an advocate for birds. We urge our members and supporters to be advocates too. You can help by becoming a member of VAS and National Audubon, volunteering for our chapter (see our volunteer opportunities at the bottom of this newsletter and on



our <u>website</u>), and support efforts to protect bird habitat. One such effort is the Ormond Beach Restoration and Access Project. This project intends to create a space that includes habitat restoration, protection of sensitive animal and plant species and improves public access. VAS has given valuable input to this project and will continue to be involved during the design and construction phases. More information on this project can be found on the City of Oxnard's website or on Facebook.

On Tuesday, February 7th the Ventura Chapter of the Surfrider Foundation will host a special program at Topa Topa brewing company. Come hear Surfrider's expert program lead, Joan Tharp, talk about Ormond Lagoon and the vital importance of restoring Ormond Beach for migratory birds and snowy plovers. Are you unable to volunteer for the chapter but still want to make a difference?

Snowy plover nesting season is around the corner and our Shorebird Recovery Team needs supplies to protect the nesting habitat. We are installing tideline fences at Ormond Beach the last week of February and need the following fencing materials:

- Cable rope: 3/16th galvanized 250 foot role; Need 8 rolls
- Cintoflex C: 6'X330' mesh rolls mesh; Need 4 rolls
- T-posts: 7' green steel; Need 100 posts
- Cable ties: 8" black UV resistant; Need 2 bags of 1,000

Christmas Bird Count Recap by Frank DeMartino

The 2022 Christmas Bird Count season is over and our Ventura circle included 102 participants that found 190 species! We tied our third highest species count ever and this is our highest count since 1994! Thank you all for your hard work and determination to find those birds.

Interesting sightings for the count included our first ever CBC sightings of: Red Knot, Northern Parula, Gray Catbird, Tropical Kingbird, and Virginia's Warbler. It's always a good count when the warblers are out and we recorded 11 different species this year. It was also a good year for geese as we got 5 of our targeted 6 species. Turkeys continue to be challenging on count day, but my #1 target bird, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, made an appearance at a feeder in Ventura! In terms of new high counts, we more than doubled our previous high count for Mountain Bluebird with 59. Yellow-crowned Night-herons continue to increase numbers at the Settling Ponds and we set a record there with 15.

Another new record goes to the Scaly-breasted Munias with 49 as they have been steadily marching through the county.

Thank you for volunteering and I look forward to doing it all again next winter!

Ventura Audubon Young Birder Program

In December a group of avid young birders from Ventura Audubon Society and the community came together to form the VAS Young Birders Club. Led by Biologist Kat Whitehouse, Outreach Coordinator Alecia Smith and Youth Liaison Max Breshears, the Young Birders Club's focus is to provide a community for those young and young at heart to share their enthusiasm for birds and their habitat. The Young Birders Club participated in the Christmas Bird



Count, gathering over 40 species. Notable species included, western snowy plover, white faced ibis, marsh wrens, and Brant. Birders, mostly under the age of 18, meet one to two times per month for birding, photography and exploration at various sites around Ventura County, creating a safe environment to interact with their peers who share a birding interest, help other young birders who are just starting out and just generally have an awesome time. VAS Young Birders will also join VAS field trips to gain knowledge from our more expierenced birders.

We have about 10 members and are looking for more. Our young birders average age is 13 and they come from Summerland to Thousand Oaks! Conejo Creek North Park


Saturday Feb 25th, 2023 Meeting Time: 8:30am

Notes from the Field Nov - Dec 2022 by Dave Pereksta

After an outstanding migration period during September and October, the next two months continued to produce a number of rare and uncommon birds. Three species that have been recorded only a few times in the county are worth highlighting. Two female **King Eiders** that were at Mussel Shoals 17-20 Dec (HR) and then later relocated at the Ventura Pier 25-31 Dec (KW & KW) constituted the third record for Ventura County. A **Lesser Black-backed Gull** at the Santa Clara River mouth 21-30 Dec (NA) is the second county record and the first in over a decade. A **Nelson's Sparrow** was at the Santa Clara River mouth on 19 Nov (MBr), which was the first record in the county in over 11 years.

A **Tundra Swan** was at the Santa Clara River Estuary on 16 Dec (SS) and was later relocated at the Saticoy Spreading Ponds 26-30 Dec (JC). A **Eurasian Wigeon** was at Lake Sherwood on 16 Dec (MB). As many as two **Black Scoters** were at the Santa Clara River mouth 14 Nov-1 Dec (MB, GA), one was at Mugu Lagoon on 18 Dec, and as many as three were at Mugu Rock 19-23 Nov (JA, GA). **Long-tailed Ducks** included one on the ocean near the Santa Clara River mouth 21 Nov-22 Dec (BJS) and another at Mussel Shoals 17-22 Dec (HR). A **Red-necked Grebe** was offshore of Mugu Lagoon 11 Nov-18 Dec (DP).

A **Sandhill Crane** flew over Camarillo on 27 Nov (JM). Two **Red Knots** were on the beach near Surfers Knoll 4-22 Dec (MBr). A **Blue-footed Booby** was reported off the Ventura Harbor on 13 Nov (AA). A **Neotropic Cormorant** continued at Lake Sherwood through 19 Dec with a second bird seen on 22 Nov (DP). An **American Bittern** was at Point Mugu on 18 Dec (DP & GP) and another continued at Lake Sherwood through 19 Dec. An immature **Zone-tailed Hawk** was in Ojai 12 Nov-13 Dec (SO) and an adult was in the upper Ojai Valley on 13 Dec (JM).

A **Broad-billed Hummingbird** visited a Ventura yard 9-10 Nov (ETG). **Williamson's Sapsuckers** included a female at Lake Piru 11 Nov-28 Dec (MB), a male in Simi Valley on 26 Nov (CK & DK), and a male on Mount Pinos on 27 Nov (DP et al.). A **Yellow-bellied Sapsucker** was at Lake Casitas on 6 Dec (LO). **Red-naped Sapsuckers** included individuals in Thousand

Oaks on 6 Nov (GR), Conejo Community Park 12-18 Nov (KR & SR), Fillmore 18-21 Dec (DH), Wheeler Gorge Campground on 16 Nov (KK), the Ventura River Steelhead Preserve on 19 Nov (GC), and a continuing bird at Lake Casitas through 28 Nov with a second bird found 12-28 Nov (LLG & RR).

A **Tropical Kingbird** was at the River Ridge Golf Course on 5 Nov (DM) and another was at Camino Real Park 17-31 Dec (MB, BL & CL). A very late **Western Kingbird** was documented at Point Mugu on 9 Dec (DP et al.). A **Gray Flycatcher** was at Arroyo Verde Park 11 Nov-31 Dec (KO). **Plumbeous Vireos** included one at Mission Oaks Park 1-6 Nov (RC), a likely returning bird from the last few winters at Pitts Ranch Park 28 Nov-18 Dec (DP), a continuing bird at Rancho Simi Park through 20 Dec that was seen with a second bird on 9 Nov (DP), and a continuing bird in Thousand Oaks through 5 Nov. As many as 40 **Pinyon Jays** continued on Mount Pinos through 5 Dec. A **Chestnut-backed Chickadee** was on the Naval Base in Port Hueneme on 12 Dec (JM), which is likely the southernmost record in California. A **Pacific Wren** was at Rincon Creek 12-31 Dec (SS) with a second bird found on 14 Dec that may be a **Winter Wren** (DP). A **Pacific/Winter Wren** was found at Sycamore Canyon on 18 Dec (SC & SS), which may be a **Winter Wren**, but further analysis is needed. A **Gray Catbird** continued in Ventura through 31 Dec and a **Sage Thrasher** was along the Santa Clara River on 25 Nov (DW). A **Red-throated Pipit** was at the Santa Clara River mouth on 20 Nov (DP et al.).

A Lapland Longspur was at Point Mugu on 18 Dec (DP & GP). A Clay-colored Sparrow was at the Thousand Oaks Community Park 23-31 Dec (JM). An apparent returning Gray-headed Junco was in Thousand Oaks 4-5 Nov (GR). A Harris's Sparrow put in a brief appearance at Lake Casitas on 30 Nov (KK). White-throated Sparrows were reported from too many areas to summarize here. A Large-billed Savannah Sparrow was at the Santa Clara River mouth 19 Nov-11 Dec (MBr) and a Swamp Sparrow was at Point Mugu 12 Nov-9 Dec (JM). Rare locally in winter, a Green-tailed Towhee was in Ventura on 17 Dec (MT).

An **Orchard Oriole** was in Ventura on 5 Nov (RMc) and another was at Bubbling Springs Park on 29 Dec (CT). A **Baltimore Oriole** was at the Kimball Barranca 25 Nov-17 Dec (CT). A **Rusty Blackbird** was frequenting a few parking lots near Telephone and Main 27-31 Dec (FD & VM).

A Northern Waterthrush continued at the Ventura Settling Ponds through 29 Dec. Black-and-white Warblers included one in Ventura on 11 Nov (NA) and a continuing individual at the Ventura Settling Ponds through 30 Dec. Tennessee Warblers occurred in unusually high numbers this fall with sightings all over southern California. Late fall local records included individuals at Pitts Ranch Park on 5 Nov (JA), Oxnard College on 11 Nov (LLG), Ventura Community Park on 14 Nov (NA), a Ventura yard on 20 Nov (RMc), the Victoria Avenue tipus on 20 Nov (NA), tipus on Telephone Road on 20 Nov (NA), Conejo Community Park on 20 Nov (RS), and Mission Oaks Park on 18 Dec (SK). A Lucy's Warbler was in Camarillo on 4 Nov (JM) and a Virginia's Warbler was near the Ventura Medical Center 17-19 Dec (RMc & JMc). A Northern Parula was at the Ventura Settling Ponds 25 Nov-22 Dec (KS) and a Canada Warbler was in an Oxnard yard 9-12 Nov (RCor).

Summer Tanagers included individuals at River Ridge Golf Course on 5 Nov (DM), Bubbling Springs Park 7 Nov-29 Dec (NA), the Ventura Settling Ponds 13-20 Nov (KS), Arroyo Verde Park on 13 Nov (MB), the Kimball Barranca 25 Nov-29 Dec (DP & SP), and one at Mission Oaks Park on 18 Dec (SK). A **Scarlet Tanager** was in the Kimball Barranca 25-26 Nov (DP & SP). Several **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks** were found around Ventura included two different ones on the east end on 4 Nov and 27 Nov (RMc), one 12-17 Dec (ETG), and one in Camino Real Park on 30 Dec (DS).

Program: Observing and Conserving the Seabirds that Rely on California's

Central Coast

Program Speaker: Dan Robinette, Point Blue Conservation Science

Seabirds are a highly visible and charismatic feature of central California's coast. They have adapted to ocean life by living long and providing increased parental care to offspring compared to other birds. These characteristics make them both a source of fascination to recreationists as well as a great research tool for studying changes in the ocean. In fact, seabirds can be easily included in both scientific monitoring and volunteer-based community science programs. Unfortunately, life on the California coast can come at a cost for seabirds. As the number of humans visiting the coast increases, so does the list of threats to seabirds. This Community Program will introduce the many seabird species that are dependent on central California's coastal habitats, discuss the threats they face, and highlight some of the conservation victories giving these birds hope. It will also demonstrate some of the ways that seabirds can be used as indicators of change in our oceans and thereby guide the management of our ocean resources.


