Shorebird Recovery Program Update

2025 Ormond Nesting Season Summary

This year we documented 56 snowy plover nests. Out of those, 26 hatched (46.4%), 28 failed (50%), and 2 had to be transferred to the Santa Barbara Zoo for captive rearing. Most exciting of all, we recorded about 18 fledglings at Ormond this season. Seeing young plovers survive to that stage is a real win.

Least terns are typically not numerous at Ormond Beach and nests that are established there do not do well, but they surprised us a little this year. We found 28 nests: and while only 5 hatched, it's still an improvement from last year, when only one nest hatched and the chick survived just one week. But this year, at least four chicks survived to fledging, the first tern fledglings we've seen here in years.

The California Condor: Brought Back from the Brink

This month we have a special program planned for you. Come out to the Poinsettia Pavilion for a social where we will have a musical performance by Sus Corez, meet our program speaker and get a chance to purchase Condor and VAS merchandize.

Program Description:

Join us for a brief history of the California Condor with the cause of its demise, and the establishment of the California Condor Recovery Program with its goal to establish captive breeding and the reintroduction of this critically endangered species back into the wild.

The California condor was listed as an endangered species in 1967. In 1987 California Condors were on the verge of extinction with only 27 alive, as the last free flying condor, AC9, was taken from the wild. In 1992, the USFWS began reintroducing captive-bred condors to the wild to

reestablish the population. Today, there are over 560 birds with over half of them flying free in the wild in various populations including California, Arizona, and Baja Mexico. The California Condor is a resident of the local area and can be found in the mountains behind Ojai, Santa Paula, Fillmore, Piru, and Santa Barbara.

The Recovery Program is currently focusing its efforts on the captive breeding and reintroduction of California condors to the wild in the hopes of establishing a self sustaining population of two geographically separate populations, one in California and the other in Arizona, each with 150 birds and at least 15 breeding pairs.


Friends of California Condors Wild and Free is a nonprofit 501c3 all volunteer organization, that has the mission to enhance public

awareness of the endangered California Condor and to ensure that they are protected, healthy, and free.



Speaker Bio:

Debbie is a board member of the non-profit Friends of California Condors, Wild & Free. Our organization supports the USFWS refuges that are home to the critically endangered California Condor. I have been a USFWS volunteer since 2008 working on the refuges as a CACO nest monitor and radio telemetry tracker in support of the California Condor Recovery program. I completed the CA naturalist program and I have a level 3 wildlife track and sign certification.

This monthly walk is specifically for beginning birders. Space is limited to ensure the guides can provide a quality experience for those less familiar with bird




identification. The walk will be at Ventura Settling Ponds where a great variety of birds can be found. The walk will introduce some of the species seen and provide tips on how to identify them.
